<p>Farook College exemplifies a vibrant commitment to multidisciplinary and interdisciplinarity within its academic framework, designed to enhance the educational experience through a rich exchange of ideas across various fields of study. This approach is not only aligned with the principles of the New Education Policy (NEP) but also aims to nurture well-rounded</p>	

students equipped with both specialized expertise and broad-based knowledge. At Farook College, the curriculum for both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) programs goes beyond traditional boundaries by integrating complementary papers from diverse departments alongside core subjects. This integration fosters a comprehensive understanding of subjects from multiple perspectives, enriching the learning process with a plurality of ideas. Students are encouraged to explore disciplines beyond their own, promoting intellectual curiosity and interdisciplinary thinking from the outset. A pivotal initiative in this multidisciplinary approach is the introduction of open courses. In the fifth semester, students have the opportunity to select an open course from any department other than their own. This cross-departmental flexibility allows students to delve deeper into areas of personal interest or to broaden their academic horizons, enhancing their overall educational experience. These open courses not only complement core studies but also contribute to the development of well-rounded individuals with a holistic understanding of various disciplines. Furthermore, Farook College integrates Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) and Audit Courses into its curriculum, reinforcing the multidisciplinary approach. AECs are mandatory and designed to enhance practical skills and knowledge beyond the core subjects, while Audit Courses provide additional academic enrichment throughout the first four semesters. In essence, Farook College's commitment to multidisciplinary and interdisciplinarity is rooted in its vision to mold a generation of students who are not only experts in their chosen fields but also possess a broader education encompassing character development, social skills, and practical abilities. By embracing the principles of the NEP and continuously evolving its academic programs, Farook College remains dedicated to fostering an intellectually stimulating environment where interdisciplinary collaboration thrives, preparing students for a dynamic and interconnected world.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Farook College, in alignment with the National Education Policy (NEP), is committed to fostering student mobility and academic flexibility across Higher Education Institutions. To this end, the college has registered with the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) and the National Academic Depository (NAD). Currently, the integration of these platforms via API is underway. With the introduction of the four-year undergraduate programs in the academic year 2024-25, Farook College aims to fully empower its students to leverage the benefits of the ABC system. This

initiative allows students to accumulate credits from their past academic experiences, select their own learning pathways, and benefit from anytime, anywhere learning opportunities. Furthermore, it enables students to progress at their own pace, thereby personalizing their educational journeys. Farook College's adoption of these innovative educational frameworks is a testament to its dedication to providing a flexible, student-centric learning environment that meets the evolving needs of modern higher education.

17.Skill development:

Farook college (Autonomous) like other institutions were propelled into online education during Covid pandemic. The IQAC and mentee colleges came together to implement the online education system. Farook College faculty volunteered for numerous faculty development programmes and training in LMS and related tools to effectively implement online education. Many faculty trained in Moodle, Google options of Tools, OBS, Openshot, KInemaster, Audacity Audio software, Olive Video Editor, Online whiteboards, recording on YouTube, Podcasting on online sites like AnchorFM, using other educational technology etc. The Faculty initially used synchronous and asynchronous mode for their classes. They would initially start their classes on G Meet, Zoom or Teams. They would also interact on Google classroom, Moodle or on Microsoft Teams. This gave ample freedom to the learners. The students reported issues of data connectivity, lack of gadgets etc which were quickly overcome through the college sponsorships and campus drive like Edusupport. The teachers conducted dynamic classes, took attendance either through automatic capture or through a google form shared among the learners. They shared online materials as e-content like PDF, short videos, doc files, powerpoint presentations etc. Teachers were also able to assess the learners. They shared quizzes, gave assignments, projects, case studies, and also gave numerous opportunities through the webinars, training and even cultural programmes through online sessions. Thus Covid brought with it a blessing in disguise as the college saw a leap into a very promising system - Blended system. It enhances the cognitive faculty of the learners and also gave them interesting learning experience. It was also evaluated that online education during the pandemic reduced face to face interactions which the students craved for. Meanwhile the students also took part in online courses on Coursera, NPTEL, Swayam and others thereby enhancing their skill as well as Knowledge

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Farook College places a strong emphasis on integrating Indian knowledge systems and culture into both its academic and extracurricular activities. Each discipline's curriculum incorporates aspects relevant to Indian knowledge and culture, enriching subjects such as Science and Mathematics with insights from Indian traditions and scholastic resources. The college organizes programs related to Yoga and other Indian practices through wings like NSS and NCC. Additionally, there is a focus on teaching Indian languages, including Hindi and Urdu, alongside the mother tongue Malayalam. Various seminars and symposia across departments further promote Indian arts and cultural forms. Students receive training in classical dances, traditional and regional music, and other artistic expressions rooted in folklore. The college has also published works on Indian knowledge systems, including translations of Malayalam books into English. Courses emphasize Indian literature and discussions on cultural aspects. Celebrations of rituals and festivals on campus deepen students' understanding and appreciation of India's rich heritage. Field trips provide insights into traditional knowledge and tribal life, while arts festivals organized by the College Students Union offer platforms for traditional art performances. The Folklore Club regularly hosts folk art performances, enhancing cultural exchange and appreciation among students. Overall, Farook College actively fosters a comprehensive understanding and practice of Indian knowledge systems and cultural traditions, nurturing a holistic educational experience.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Farook College is dedicated to Outcome Based Education (OBE) to ensure academic excellence and sustainable learning, equipping students for future careers and global citizenship. Aligned with UGC directives, the college initiated curriculum reform in 2022 through the Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF), approved by the Academic Council. Oversight of OBE implementation is entrusted to the Quality Learning Cell (QLC) under the IQAC, ensuring adherence across all departments. The institution's vision and mission guide the development of graduate attributes, program outcomes (POs), and course outcomes (COs), facilitating clear communication of learning objectives to students. Monitoring of graduate performance involves assessing PO achievement, enabling continuous enhancement of teaching methodologies. Evaluation of program outcome attainment hinges on course outcome achievement, assessed quantitatively through

defined performance criteria. Direct attainment is gauged by grades from assessment tools, while indirect attainment is gleaned from course-end surveys. Formative assessments such as assignments and seminars are integral to this process, providing ongoing feedback on student progress. Through both curricular and co-curricular activities, students engage with course outcomes, reinforcing discipline excellence and the principles of outcome-based education in teaching and assessment practices.

20.Distance education/online education:

Farook College has adeptly embraced online education, leveraging a range of digital tools and platforms to enhance both teaching and learning experiences. Faculty members have enthusiastically participated in numerous faculty development programs and training sessions focused on Learning Management Systems (LMS) and related technologies. They have been trained in various tools including Moodle, Google Suite, OBS Studio, Openshot, KineMaster, Audacity, Olive Video Editor, online whiteboards, YouTube recording, podcasting platforms like AnchorFM, and other educational technologies. This extensive training equips them to effectively deliver online courses and engage students in virtual classrooms. Simultaneously, students have actively engaged in online courses offered by platforms like Coursera, NPTEL, and Swayam, thereby expanding their skills and knowledge base beyond the traditional curriculum. Looking ahead, Farook College has designed certificate courses to be launched through its own LMS platform, FCLMS, in the upcoming academic year, further enhancing online learning opportunities for students. Moreover, the college serves as a study center for Calicut University's School of Distance Education and as a learner support center for SN University, facilitating distance education programs. This dual role underscores Farook College's commitment to providing flexible and accessible educational opportunities through innovative online and distance learning initiatives.

The curriculum of the college is fundamentally allied with local, national, regional, and global developmental needs. This orientation is evident through the clearly defined Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) across its various programmes. The curriculum encompasses various knowledge systems and technical skills required for developmental needs at various levels. The courses

offered in various undergraduate and postgraduate programs reflect this commitment. For instance, The B.Sc. Botany programme is focused on the ecological and economic aspects of plant sciences, emphasizing interdisciplinary knowledge of botany and chemistry. The curriculum places a strong emphasis on biodiversity preservation and environmental awareness. Similarly, The BA and MA Economics programmes offer a comprehensive exploration of economic theories and practices promoting the national and local developments. The question how the development at national level and local can be enhanced through various policies is addressed in the curriculum of these programmes. B.Sc. and M.Sc. Psychology programmes offer a holistic curriculum in psychology, covering human behaviour, cognitive processes, psychological measurement, social psychology, and counselling. Students gain practical skills in conducting experiments and understanding psychological disorders, fostering a research-oriented attitude for careers in counselling, healthcare, and related fields.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

The curriculum of the undergraduate and postgraduate programmes

encompass content relevant to professional ethics, gender issues, human values, environment and sustainability. Courses such as Communication Laws and Ethics, Public Relations and Corporate Communications, and Professional Business Skills address various aspects of professional ethics. Similarly, courses like Gender and Society, Gender Economics, and Women's Writings cover topics related to gender. Another thrust area is environment and sustainability. The curriculum of various programmes also focuses on the topics such as Environment and Sustainability, Earth and Environment, Natural Resource Management, Environmental Geology, and Conservation Biology.

Under open courses, departments offer courses specifically aimed at addressing local issues and sustainable development. These include Sustainable Development, Non-Conventional Energy Sources, Life Skill Development, Reproductive Health and Sex Education, and locally relevant Agro-Biometrical Science.

At the postgraduate level, core courses in Arts and Social Sciences provide a philosophical foundation for the human values. Elective courses address specialized areas of local and developmental needs. Emerging areas covered in the curriculum include Economics of Growth and Development, Women's Writing, Dalit Literature, Literature and Ecology, Malabar and Indian Ocean, Environmental History of India, Epigraphy in Kerala History, Film Studies, Advertising and Marketing Communication, Natural Products and Polymers, Organometallic Chemistry, and Microprocessors, Microcontrollers and Applications.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses students' learning levels and organises special programmes for both slow and advanced learners.

At the commencement of each program, the institution evaluates students' learning levels through departmental entry tests, identifying slow and advanced learners. This assessment informs targeted support strategies. Slow learners receive special attention and two-week bridge courses to prepare them for their disciplines. Advisors help classify students using observations and class tests.

Advanced learners engage in peer teaching, while slow learners attend remedial classes, including those provided by the English department. These remedial classes, reading exercises, and library visits enhance language skills. The institution also offers induction programmes to give students an overview of their courses. Various departments conduct bridge courses: basic grammar for language departments, computer fundamentals for the Computer Science department, orientation for Multimedia, and fundamental statistics for the Statistics department.

Strategies for slow learners include remedial classes, peer teaching, group study, and academic counselling. Special attention is given to students with prolonged absences, foreign students and those involved in sports.

For advanced learners, PG students are trained in research and encouraged to publish and present papers. The college's publication wing supports literary skills. Advanced learners receive professional coaching, enrol in MOOC courses, and prepare for competitive exams. UG and PG students are encouraged to interact with research scholars.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The college emphasizes experiential learning through diverse practical experiences. Community outreach programs, industry visits, and advanced lab training are organized to provide students with hands-on exposure. The Department of Botany offers modules like Mushroom Cultivation Demonstrations and in vitro cultures of *Gymnema sylvestre*. Zoology students engage in projects identifying avian and butterfly diversity on campus. Collaborations with industries provide internships and field visits, enhancing professional skills. The Department of Commerce and Management Studies conducts management meets to develop entrepreneurial skills. In partnership with the Agricultural Research Station, the Botany Department organizes hands-on training in horticultural techniques. Virtual Lab facilities in Physics offer problem-solving experiences. The History Department arranges archaeological fieldwork, while Computer Science students undertake projects in mobile app and website development.

The college fosters participative learning to make education active and equitable. Reflective teaching methods such as brainstorming, seminars, group discussions, and debates promotes student participation. The Sociology Department integrates survey studies to support collaborative learning. Problem-solving methodologies are emphasized to develop a comprehensive

understanding of concepts. The Career and Innovation Hub organizes programs to enhance employability skills in line with industry demands. Student projects and frequent assignments are designed to develop skills in observation, analysis, interpretation, and application.

Teachers integrate ICT-enabled tools and online resources with traditional instruction to engage students in long-term learning and optimize education delivery. Online classes are conducted via platforms like Zoom, Google Classroom and Google Meet.

Integration of ICT in Teaching:

Teachers utilize Learning Management Systems (LMS) through platforms such as Moodle, Google Classroom, and Teachmint. These tools support the teaching-learning process in line with contemporary demands.

Webinars: Teachers regularly organize online conferences and webinars for students, which are also accessible to the public.

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

Farook College has 98 ICT enabled classrooms. In addition, the college has seminar and conference rooms. Ten of these are smart halls equipped with adaptable audio-visual theaters that can accommodate more than a hundred and twenty pupils at a time and two board rooms for executive meetings. The science departments namely Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, and Psychology, provide innovative laboratories for undergraduate, postgraduate, and research studies along with separate rooms for scholars. Similarly, the Mathematical and Computational Science Departments, which include Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Science, have well equipped computer labs. Chemistry Department has a computer facility specifically designed for computational Chemistry. A media lab, a computer lab, an audio production center and a studio are among the other amenities that are available to support the Department of Multimedia and Journalism & Mass Communication's demands. The Department of Vocational Studies provides resources like an IT lab, an automobile lab and an automobile workshop, the Commerce Department maintains its own computer lab. A Language Lab is available to support language instruction and a library that can be accessed by both students and the public. The college has Psychological Services and Training Center and a Center for Start-up and Incubation.

The college has implemented a maintenance strategy for its infrastructure, equipment, and facilities. An Engineering Wing, comprising a supervisor, assistants, electricians, plumbers, and qualified, experienced engineers, is responsible for maintaining the building and its infrastructure. The buildings and related facilities are periodically inspected by the engineering section. A separate Instrumentation Maintenance Centre is responsible for maintaining IT and network facilities. Technical Assistants work under the qualified technician who supervises the system. The college and the Instrumentation Maintenance Center both have a complaint booking system in place. Computers and lab equipment are maintained and tested monthly. The engineering section handles building and associated installation issues, while the instrumentation facility center is tasked with maintaining computers and networks, including OFC LAN and WiFi. Under the supervision of the supervisor, classroom labs are swept and cleaned every working day. In order to standardize procedures for maintaining college property and equipment, the college intends to establish a baseline. The college aims to provide equal access to resources and information for all stakeholders.

Rigorous measures are in place to ensure all students, regardless of gender, have equal opportunities in both academic and extracurricular activities. Separate restrooms with napkin vending machines and incinerators, and a common area are reserved exclusively for female students, while a Day-care centre caters to the needs of female staff and students. Presence of security personnel and a gated campus also ensures security. Farook College employs robust waste management practices across various fronts. Solid waste, including organic garbage and food scraps from campus, is processed daily in a biogas plant located in the residence hall, generating 16 liters of gas per day and saving nearly Rs.39,000 monthly. Liquid waste is managed via a comprehensive system: all hostels feature wastewater treatment plants that recycle water for toilet use. Laboratory wastewater undergoes initial dilution in settling tanks before percolating into the ground. Faculty promotes microanalysis in labs to minimize solvent and chemical usage. Biomedical waste from the campus health center is collected monthly by the Indian Medical Association (IMA), with operational costs of Rs. 2250 covered under an agreement with the college. E-waste management involves the college employing a technical assistant to salvage functional components from discarded electronics like servers and computers, using a dedicated service area for storage and repairs. Hazardous chemicals in laboratories are safely handled with fume hoods to contain volatile substances. Hazardous liquids are neutralized and diluted before disposal to reduce toxicity. Radioactive materials used for gamma/beta radiation sources are securely stored within lead blocks to prevent unintended radiation exposure. These initiatives underscore Farook College's commitment to sustainable waste management practices while ensuring environmental safety and compliance.

- Performed 4,680 dialysis procedures from April 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023

Unique Feature:

- This is the first dialysis centre in Kerala to be conducted by college management, faculty, students, and alumni.

Additional Notes:

- The dialysis centre is supported by Farook College management, faculty, students, and alumni.
- Water for dialysis and related activities is supplied from the college well.
- A patient undergoes dialysis for four hours, three days a week (except Sundays).
- Around 2.5 kg of waste is eliminated from the body during each dialysis session.
